Example and instructions

In this questionnaire, you will read three stories and respond to questions that follow each story. Please read this example before completing the questionnaire. For each story you are asked to think about the main person in the story. Consider the following example:

Bob's favorite uncle recently died and left Bob and his family a lot of money. Bob now must make some decisions about how the money should be used. Bob and his wife have gone to see a financial counselor and received a lot of information about how to best use the money. One suggestion is to pay off some debt. Other suggestions are to develop trust funds for their children to take care of their educational needs. Bob also thinks about how tough life has been for the family—saving and scrimping to live in a good area of town—and would love to have some fun with part of the money. He thinks about a new car, a cruise, or a trip to a resort.

Following each story you will be presented with a number of choices that someone could select in order to deal with the situation. For each choice, you will be asked to rate how good it is using the following scale:

- 1 – I strongly believe that this is a GOOD choice**
- 2 – I believe that this is a GOOD choice**
- 3 – I am not sure**
- 4 – I believe that this is a BAD choice**
- 5 – I strongly believe that this is a BAD choice**

The following are examples of choices that you might think about:

- _____ 1. Bob should spend the money on himself.
- _____ 2. Bob should invest the money.
- _____ 3. Bob should pay off debt.
- _____ 4. Bob should spend the money on his family

Your job is to rate each solution using the scale above. For example, someone might feel that number one is a terrible choice for Bob, that number two is questionable, that number three is a great solution, and that number four is a pretty good choice. Therefore, number one would be rated with a 4, number two with a 5, number three with a 1, and number four with a 2.

Following this, you will be asked to rank the best and worst choices. For instance, one might say that number three is the best reason and number one is the worst reason.

Next, you will be asked to consider a number of reasons someone might consider in making a choice. Specifically, you will be asked to judge each reason on the following scale:

- 1 – I strongly believe that this is a GOOD reason.**
- 2 – I believe that this is a GOOD reason.**
- 3 – I am not sure.**
- 4 – I believe that that this is a BAD reason.**
- 5 – I strongly believe that this is a BAD reason.**

The following are examples of reasons that you might see:

- _____ 1. Being out of debt is the only way to begin making and saving money.
- _____ 2. Bob will feel better about himself as a family provider.
- _____ 3. Bob and his family deserve to spend the money to make up for all of the hard times.
- _____ 4. He has to do something with the money.

Considering Bob’s story and remembering that number three was selected as the best action, then someone might feel that number 1 is exactly what he or she was thinking in choosing the solution. Similarly, someone might think that number 2 has a little bit to do with what he or she was thinking in choosing the solution, that number 3 has nothing to do with the choice, and that number 4 is not much better. Following this thinking, number one should be rated a 1, number two a 2, number three with a 4, and number four with a 3 or a 4.

After rating reach item you will be asked to rank the best and worst reason. Based on the above it would make sense to rank number one as the best reason and number three or number four as the worst reason.

When you are finished with this example, you may turn to the first story and begin.

Things are looking good for David in his senior year of high school. He has a great group of friends and the girlfriend of his dreams. The academic side looks good too and if he gets the full-tuition scholarship then he will accomplish his goal of becoming the first person from his family to attend college. Without the scholarship David can't afford to go. David looks forward to going to State with his friends and girlfriend who are already planning to go and can swing it financially.

The only problem is nailing down the scholarship. Dave's school counselor has told him that he is right on the line with his test scores and would be a "shoe-in" if he can improve his ACT Math scores. The counselor knows how much the scholarship means to David and has set him up with a tutor. David knows he has one shot left to improve his scores. David is not particularly pleased about all the time he has to spend on math because he has had less time for his friends, particularly his girlfriend. However, he remains focused because he feels all the hard work and sacrifice will be worthwhile in the long run when they are all at State together.

Although his friends and girlfriend understand David's situation, they can't believe that he would pass up the opportunity to go on the senior trip to Washington, D.C. during spring break. His girlfriend asks him to reconsider and warns him that her patience is wearing thin. She tells him that the trip would be a perfect way to spend some much needed quality time together. He really would like to go on the trip and be with his friends. But he knows that if he goes he will have to cut his studying short since the ACT is scheduled for the day after he would get home and David knows that he wouldn't be able to study much on the trip. Taking the test the day after he gets back isn't a good idea either since he might be too tired to do a good job. If that happened then all that work would have been wasted. To top it off, his tutor mentioned that he will be conducting some important drill sessions on the Wednesday and Thursday before the ACT, which she says really makes a difference. If he went on the trip then he would miss these sessions.
